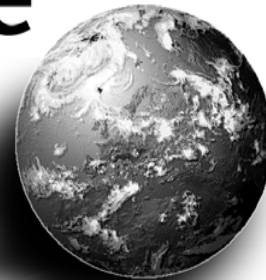

# Mission

- education in cancer nursing
- nursing research, including the publication of the useful research results of such research

- Cancer nursing makes a difference to patients and their families.
- Cancer nurses have key roles to perform across the continuum of cancer experiences beginning before diagnosis and continuing throughout treatment and advanced disease.
- Cancer nursing is a specialty requiring additional knowledge and skill beyond basic nursing preparation.
